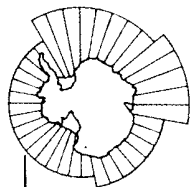

## Registration for Deep Sea 2003 opens

Registration for the world's first global conference on deep sea fisheries is now officially open.

Conference organisers expect registrations, which can be made via the event website [www.deepsea.govt.nz](http://www.deepsea.govt.nz), to be high with more than 30 countries having already registered an interest in attending.

Registrations to Deep Sea 2003, to be held in Queenstown, New Zealand, from 1-5 December, are limited to 500 people.

Delegates at the five day conference will discuss issues ranging from deep sea fisheries population biology, harvesting issues and the technology required to manage and harvest deep sea resources, to resource management and conservation strategies as a basis for future governance and management of deep sea areas.

Full conference delegate registration is \$975 (NZD) if received by October 16, 2003, and \$1,100 for registrations received after this date.

There is also a student registration fee of \$500 available for students with identification.

The cost includes the Sunday night welcome cocktail function, official conference opening, conference satchel and handbook, list of attendees, admission to all sessions, morning and afternoon teas and lunches during the conference, poster session cocktails, airport meet and greet, transfer to accommodation on arrival and departure, and the conference gala dinner.

Daily registration is \$250, and includes a conference satchel and handbook, morning, afternoon teas and lunch during the day, and admission to sessions on the selected day.

There are also registration options for partners and children, which include organised activities.

## World experts to speak

Dr Michael Sissenwine, director of scientific programmes and chief science adviser for the United States National Marine Fisheries Service, will join the leading line up of fisheries experts to speak at Deep Sea 2003.

Dr Sissenwine has over 20 years experience as a research scientist and has coordinated research programmes across the USA in various roles for a number of years. He has provided expert scientific input to a wide range of international scientific, policy and management forums to assist in conservation and resource management decision-making.

Mr Mike Sutton, of the David and Lucile Packard Foundation in California, Mr Alastair Macfarlane, General Manager Trade and Information at the New Zealand Seafood Industry Council, and Dr Amos Barkai of Ocean and Land Resource Assessment Consultants. These speakers join Dr Andre Punt, Dr Andy Rosenberg, Dr John Gordon, Dr Wendy Craik, Professor Douglas Johnson, Professor Moritaka Hayashi, and Mr Michael Lodge as confirmed speakers.



## Pre-conference meetings

A range of interesting meetings will take place prior to the main conference. These meetings will focus on specific and important issues relating to deepwater fisheries, and will provide the opportunity for in-depth examination of issues prior to the conference.

Topics currently to be covered in the pre-conference meeting programme include:

- \* Management of deep water artisanal and small scale fisheries
- \* Marine bioprospecting
- \* Conservation and management of deepwater elasmobranchs
- \* Assessment and management of deepwater fisheries.

There will be no registration fee for these meetings which will be held in Dunedin at University of Otago. Travel across to Queenstown will be organised for those attendees who have registered for Deep Sea 2003.

## New Zealand – a few facts

The All Blacks, the Americas Cup, Kiwifruit, Lord of the Rings and let's not forget sheep... This is just a short list of icons and images that epitomise the international idea of New Zealand - but there's more, much more:

- \* Dutch navigator Abel Tasman first discovered New Zealand in 1642
- \* Captain James Cook claimed it for Britain in 1769 and produced a map of the country
- \* New Zealand's indigenous Maori make up about 14% of the population
- \* The Maori name for New Zealand is Aotearoa - the land of the long white cloud
- \* The two islands combined are slightly larger than Great Britain
- \* The New Zealand population passed the 4 million mark last month
- \* The South Island is known to Kiwis as the mainland, despite housing only a quarter of the population
- \* Mount Cook is New Zealand's highest peak
- \* The Tasman Glacier in the Southern Alps is the largest glacier in New Zealand
- \* Fiordland in New Zealand is one of the world's largest National Parks
- \* Queenstown is home to the first, and original Bungy Jump, still running after 15 years
- \* Sir Edmund Hillary of New Zealand, and Tenzing Norgay of Nepal, were the first people to climb Mount Everest in 1953

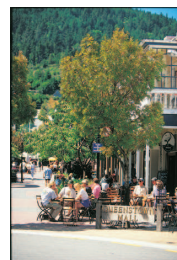
